UCC Launches First Doctoral Degrees with MLSS Endorsement – Featured in JIS

The University of the Commonwealth Caribbean (UCC) officially launched its highly anticipated Doctor of Business Administration (DBA) and Doctor of Professional Practice (DPP) programmes, solidifying its role as Jamaica's premier innovation-driven university and strengthening its contribution to national and regional development.

The launch event, held at UCC's Main Campus in Kingston on Wednesday, May 28, was graced by the Honourable Pearnel Charles Jr., MP, JP, Minister of Labour and Social Security, who delivered the keynote address and strongly endorsed the initiative.

"We have to continue to foster innovation, to empower our people." Minister Charles further emphasized that the new doctoral offerings will play a pivotal role in shaping Jamaica's labour market and economy by retaining top-tier talent, driving innovation, and boosting productivity across sectors.

UCC's President, Professor Colin Gyles, CD, highlighted the significance of the launch, noting that it comes on the heels of UCC's re-accreditation by the UK-based Accreditation Service for International Colleges and Universities (ASIC) and its recognition as a University by the University Council of Jamaica (UCJ) and the Jamaica Tertiary Education Commission (JTEC).

Designed for mid- to senior-level professionals, the DBA and DPP programmes offer flexible, part-time structures ranging from three to seven years. They include structured support workshops, supervisory mentorship, and independent research aimed at producing transformational, real-world outcomes across industries.



COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY '25



The 2025 Commencement ceremony stood as a powerful testament to the transformative capacity of education and the enduring belief that potential is not defined by circumstance. Among the graduating class of more than 800 were ten Jamaicans currently serving sentences in local correctional facilities, individuals who completed associate and bachelor's degrees in business administration through the University of the Commonwealth Caribbean. Their presence at this ceremony elevated the occasion beyond academic celebration, underscoring UCC's commitment to inclusive education, rehabilitation, and national development. Their achievement affirmed that learning, when paired with opportunity and discipline, can serve as a catalyst for renewal and purpose.

In a moment that resonated deeply with all in attendance, the summa cum laude graduate who responded on behalf of the cohort captured the spirit of the day, declaring, "We didn't just earn degrees, we regained our dignity." Those words encapsulated the essence of the overall graduation ceremony—one defined not only by certificates conferred, but also by lives reshaped, confidence restored, and futures reimagined. As graduates crossed the stage from diverse backgrounds and journeys, this ceremony reinforced the enduring message that education empowers, redeems, and equips individuals to contribute meaningfully to society, regardless of where their journey began.



UCC Confers Honorary Doctorates on Dr. Peter Phillips, Dr. Nigel Clarke, and Audrey Stewart-Hinchcliffe for Transformational Contributions to National Development

The 2025 Commencement Ceremony on Sunday, July 20, at 11:00 a.m. at the National Arena saw the conferment of three nation builders.

Dr. The Honourable Peter Phillips, OJ, MP, former Minister of Finance and Planning, received the Honorary Doctor of Economics (D.Econ) in recognition of his central role in Jamaica's fiscal transformation. As Finance Minister (2012–2016), he led a landmark International Monetary Fund (IMF) agreement that restored global confidence and helped stabilise the economy. His legacy included debt reduction, inclusive policy-making, and more than three decades of public service. A respected lecturer and author, Dr. Phillips shaped national dialogue on governance and development. "He is a visionary and a respected voice in Caribbean public policy," said UCC President Professor Colin Gyles. "His leadership and commitment to equity reflect the core values of UCC and the lasting impact of nation-building."

Dr. Nigel Clarke, Deputy Managing Director at the IMF and former Minister of Finance and the Public Service, received the Honorary Doctor of Finance (DFin) for his leadership in transforming Jamaica's economy. A Rhodes Scholar and Oxford-trained economist, Dr. Clarke spearheaded key reforms including central bank independence, the creation of an independent fiscal commission, tax policy overhaul, and strengthened public sector governance. "Dr. Clarke's impressive track record at both national and international levels exemplifies the transformative power of purpose-driven public service," Gyles said, adding: "We are proud to honour him for shaping a resilient economic framework that continues to inspire the region and the world."

Mrs. Audrey Stewart-Hinchcliffe, CD, JP, Founder and Chairman of Caribbean Health Management Consultants Ltd. and the Manpower & Maintenance Services Limited Group, received the Honorary Doctorate in Business and Entrepreneurship (D.B.E. Hon.). A pioneer in healthcare and business, she served as CARICOM's first Health Development Officer, shaping policy across 17 member states and advancing regional health development. An accomplished author and passionate advocate for job creation and skills training, her work helped build stronger communities and contributed significantly to nation-building in Jamaica. Her lasting impact spanned the health, education, and business sectors. "We were honoured to recognise Mrs. Stewart-Hinchcliffe, a trailblazer whose leadership and innovation exemplify the values UCC stands for," said Gyles.

ANNUAL RESEARCH CONFERENCE

Featured in The Gleaner and Our Today

The University of the Commonwealth Caribbean (UCC) opened its 9th Annual Research Conference at its main campus in Kingston on Wednesday, September 24, with a compelling keynote address from the university Chancellor Professor John MacIntyre.

Held under the theme 'Living and Working with Artificial Intelligence', Professor MacIntyre called on educators and institutions to embrace artificial intelligence (AI) as a transformative tool in teaching, learning, and research. The Chancellor, in his presentation, urged the academic community to shift from a mindset of policing AI to one of purposeful integration, equipping students with the skills to use the technology effectively in the real world.

On Day 2 of the Research Conference, Pro-Chancellor Professor Emeritus Anthony Clayton explored the global transformations driven by population growth, urbanization and climate change. In his presentation, Professor Clayton emphasized changes in the global demography, with societies growing older, more urban, and more technologically dependent.

A major focus of his presentation was on health care as a case study. Life expectancy, which has remained stagnant for centuries, has seen exponential growth in the last 200 years due to advances in sanitation, nutrition, and medicine. However, in recent years, the global health landscape has been dominated by non-communicable diseases (NCDs) such as cardiovascular illness, cancer, diabetes, and respiratory conditions, which account for 74% of mortality rates.

Ultimately, the session emphasized that as the world grows older, richer, and more urban, harnessing AI responsibly in healthcare will be central to addressing future challenges. Both days one and two were featured in The Gleaner, with subsequent publications in the online magazine, Our Today.

UCC Hosts Annual Work and Travel Expo

The Department of Student Services (DSS) on Wednesday, October 8 hosted the highly-anticipated Work and Travel Expo at our main campus in Kingston.

Approximately 16 agencies registered to showcase their student travel programmes, explain their application processes and to share programme requirements. The DSS Team (David Tulloch, DSS Director and Oneil Dowe, DSS Student Success Supervisor), including Professor Warner guided the students with valuable insights on selecting suitable programmes, preparing successful applications, and maximizing opportunities for personal and financial growth abroad.

This remarkable exposition attracted 255 students attended in person and 260 joined via Zoom, totaling a whopping 515 participants! Breast Cancer Awareness Campaign

Business Lecturer Dr. Odetha Davis Shares News Editorial with The Observer

Dr. Odetha Davis, Business Lecturer here at UCC, also contributed a compelling editorial to the Jamaica Observer examining the deeper impact of Hurricane Melissa.

In her article, Dr. Davis draws national attention to the often overlooked "hidden casualties" of the storm, the thousands of Jamaicans in the tourism sector whose livelihoods were disrupted when hotels and related businesses were forced to close. She stresses that beyond the physical damage to properties, the real crisis lies in the economic and emotional strain placed on housekeepers, bartenders, craft vendors, tour operators, taxi drivers, and other workers who suddenly find themselves without income or security.

Her perspective not only broadens the national conversation around post-hurricane recovery but also showcases UCC's thought leadership during a critical moment for Jamaica's rebuilding efforts.

UCCF Leaves Lasting Impact on Good Samaritan Inn with Beautification Project

On Sunday, November 9, the UCCF hosted a meaningful Beautification and Donation Project at the Good Samaritan Inn, bringing together volunteers to uplift the space and support those who rely on its services.
